meeting, just to name a few events. The deadline to register has passed but those who are attending will find it very enjoyable.


Christmas Party



The Founding of The Order of Granaderos de Gálvez And The Order of Damas de Gálvez

Have you ever wondered how the Order of Granaderos y Damas de Gálvez San Antonio Chapter formed? Have you wondered when, and who were the founding members of both the Granaderos de Gálvez and Damas de Gálvez? I mentioned this to

Robert Thonhoff and, as he often does, he came to the rescue.

"Don't worry, I have a brochure that will help tell the story of the founding of the organization." He sent a brochure over to me that helped explain the beginnings of the organization. Today, we can see the growth, achievements and expansion of Granaderos throughout the country.

THE FOUNDING of THE ORDER OF GRANADEROS de GÁLVEZ

Los Granaderos de Gálvez was founded in 1975 by Mr. Charles E. Barrera and Mr. Henry Guerra, both from San Antonio, Texas. Mr. Barrera was Supreme Governor General from 1975 to 1981. He was a Canary Island

Descendant and President General of The Sons of the Republic of Texas. He was a member of several civic, genealogical, and historical organizations.

For those of us who remember Henry Guerra, he was one of the best newscasters in San Antonio when television was just coming of age and he would end his newscasts with, "Good night y muy buenas noches". As members of the local Bicentennial Commission, both Mr. Barrera and Mr. Guerra, extended an invitation to Erik I. Martel, then the newly installed Consul General of Spain housed in Houston, to be their guest for the U.S. Bicentennial Celebration in San Antonio. The ceremony would be held at Fort Sam Houston National Cemetery honoring all War Veterans starting with General Bernardo de Gálvez. Consul General Martel accepted the invitation. From this conversation, Charles E. Barrera, Henry Guerra, and Erik I. Martel conceived the idea

Founder and Honorary Member of the Order of Granaderos de Gálvez of the founding of Los Granaderos de Gálvez to educate the public about the great contributions that General Bernardo de Gálvez made to the American colonies during the American Revolution.

Consul General Erik I. Martel gave his full support to the idea of an American organization that would honor the unsung hero, General Bernardo de Gálvez.

Mr. and Mrs. Barrera went to Madrid, Spain, to research the military uniforms and other pertinent information on Gálvez and his era. During this time, the Barrera's gave interviews to the newspaper and television outlets, including how the San Antonio Granaderos marched in the Bicentennial parade in San Antonio.

Back in the United States, the Barreras began speaking about Gálvez at meetings of various organizations and finally succeeded in forming a small nucleus of Los Granaderos de Gálvez. Mr. Barrera founded the first chapter in San Antonio, Texas, becoming the Supreme Governor General Commander. The charter

members were Ventura G. Perez (Granadero Joe Perez' father), Adolfo Herrera, Henry de Leon, (Dama Dolores Beardsley's brother and Dama Deanna Rodriguez' great uncle), Manuel Borrego and Raymond Ugalde.

By 1977, a second chapter was founded in El Paso, followed by a chapter in Galveston and Houston in 1978. Chapters were later founded in Jacksonville FL, St. Augustine FL, Pensacola FL, and Washington D.C. The current chapters are in San Antonio, Houston, Pensacola, Laredo, and Louisiana. All chapters are dedicated in their efforts to carry out the goals of the Order, making people aware of the Spanish contributions to the success of the American Revolution.



Mr. Charles E. Barrera Born July 14, 1910-Died January 4, 1981

In November 1978, King Juan Carlos of Spain granted the first audience to the Granaderos and Damas de Gálvez. In June 1979, the king appointed Charles Barrera as Honorary Vice Consul of Spain in San Antonio. One month later, the King honored Charles Barrera with the highest decoration that is bestowed upon a civilian, "La Encomienda de la Orden del Merito Civil." Former Consul General Erik Martel is quoted in a letter to Mr. Barrera, dated November 13, 1981, "To summarize, Charles gave his all for the Granaderos and anything I can say in this respect or anything we, who are honored by belonging to the Order today can do, will always be little.

THE FOUNDING of THE ORDER OF DAMAS de GÁLVEZ



Alicia de la Cerda Barrera Founder, Order of Damas de Galvez Born November 23, 1911-Died August 8, 2000

The Order of Damas de Gálvez was founded in June 1977 in San Antonio, Texas by Mrs. Alicia de la Cerda Barrera. Shortly thereafter, the El Paso Chapter of The Order of Damas de Gálvez was founded followed by Damas chapters in Galveston TX, Houston TX, Jacksonville FL, and St. Augustine FL.

In August 1978, the first Supreme Council Meeting and Annual Convention of the Damas was held in San Antonio with the respective founders Charles E. Barrera, Governor General and Alicia de la Cerda Barrera as Dama of the Grand Cross of Gálvez presiding.

Mr. and Mrs. Barrera were dedicated in their efforts to carry out the goals of the Order, making people aware of the Spanish contributions to the success of the American War of Independence.

The Damas de Gálvez, as a separate entity, dissolved and membership status in the Granaderos was modified so that male and female members held equal status and became known as the Order of Granaderos y Damas de Gálvez.

Our Mission remains the same today, "To educate the public about Spain's participation in the American Revolution." And so, we conclude our story with the words "Good night y muy buenas noches"
